This week's reflection is an extract from 'One Life' by Steve Uppal.

'The Kairos moment

In the New Testament, the Bible uses two main Greek words when speaking about "time". The first is Chronos, from which we get the word chronological, referring to "the passage of time". This is time that we can measure. The second word is Kairos, meaning time in the sense of a right time for something to happen, an "opportunity" or a "favourable occasion". A kairos moment, in spiritual terms, is a window of opportunity, an appointed time in the purposes of God. It is a time when the conditions are exactly right for the accomplishment of critical action. The famous Latin motto Carpe Diem or "Seize the day", captures the essence of Kairos. Kairos moments are times when we need to make the most of a God-given opportunity and seize it with both hands. The birth of Christ was a Kairos moment in history. God had waited for the most opportune moment and had acted when that time came........

.....Just as God has intervened in history at various points like this, he works in our lives as individuals in exactly the same way. God intervenes in our life and gives us Kairos moments – key opportunities for us to accomplish something for him. All we need is courage to reach out and take hold of them. Who knows, this week may present such a moment for you.'

<u>School</u>

Amethyst Class In Amethyst Class this week, we continued to read 'Let's all Creep Through the Crocodile Creek' by Jonny Lambert. We retold the story with puppets, added sound effects and looked at alliteration. In maths, we 'tagged' objects in a group of up to 20 objects, counted up to 20 things that couldn't be seen or tagged, such as jumps, hops, sounds and developed strategies to keep track of what had and had not been counted, for example, rearranging objects into a line/moving objects as they were counted. We recognised the pattern of the counting system, counting out loud beyond 20. We also enjoyed making clay animals and playing tennis in PE.

Sapphire Class This week in Sapphire Class we have been enjoying writing about our book 'The Curious Case of the Missing Mammoth'. We have been writing descriptive sentences and writing our own poems about the different animals and things the characters come across in the museum. In Maths we have been learning about measurement. We have been using the words taller, shorter, longer, length and height. We have been measuring with items and measuring with cms. This week we have particularly enjoyed playing cricket, tasting fruit, learning about George Stephenson and making our own paper sculptures.

Pearl Class In English, the children have written descriptions of the wolf in the story 'The Last Wolf' by Mini Grey. In Maths we have recognised one third of shapes and found one third of a number of objects. In Design and Technology, they have designed a fairground Ferris wheel with a wheel, an axle, and axle holder, frame and pods. In Music the children created their own weather songs, accompanying with percussion instruments. In Science we have looked at a variety of seeds. We discussed 'Why are seeds different?' and 'What do you think grows from these seeds?' The children classified seeds in different ways using a Venn Diagram.

Amber Class This week, Amber class have been calculating how to add and subtract money and how to find change. The have worked on using speech marks correctly and using conjunctions in English. The children have learned about the journey of a river in Geography and made their own Papyrus paper in Art. The class have recapped running stitch and learned how to cross stitch in DT. The children have worked on using cell names in their computing lessons in spreadsheets. We have also been rehearsing our group and solo performances for the musical showcase after half term.

Emerald Class This week, Emerald Class have been working on their stamina in PE: they have been learning how to pace themselves so that they can run for a full five minutes and we are seeing some great improvements. We have also begun to learn about what makes something 'alive', in Science, and have been organising animals into our own groups. In History, we have started our new topic on the Ancient Greeks, so we are excited to get this great topic going. We have also been finishing off our fabric pencil cases for DT and we look forward to showing them to our parents at the class assembly next week.











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Ruby Class We are at the end of another superb week in Ruby class. On Monday and Tuesday morning the children presented their projects to the rest of the class, and it was obvious how much work all the children had put in. The children have been working incredibly hard in Maths looking at tenths, being able to describe, compare and order them. During English, Ruby class have written a diary entry in role as the old man (from the text 'The Paper Bag Prince') focusing on his daily routine, the moments of peace before the lorries came and the animals who lived at the rubbish dump. During Science, the children have been looking at describing the life process of reproduction in some plants and animals. Year 5 class show continued hard work in all other foundation subjects.

Diamond Class Well, it's been SATs week this week. The children have been amazing and really put their all into completing the gruelling tests. In between scribbling away in the hall, the class have been engaged in some laid-back revision on key concepts and methods in the classroom, and have also been taking some well-earned time to relax outside and make the most out of the decent weather we have been experiencing this week. On Friday morning, the children will be receiving a stand-alone cricket lesson with Mr Parish, watching a film with Mr Blenkiron, and then enjoying an afternoon of games and guitars with Mr Perry and Mr Stannard.
